American Nicaraguan School Service Record

In order to achieve The American Nicaraguan School Service Cord, you must complete at least 150 hours of community service throughout your High School career. To ensure that you are completing the hours and reflecting on the experience, you will have to complete the *Service Record* after every community service activity. The *Service Record* will present evidence that you completed a service activity and have taken the time to think about and reflect on your contribution to the community. The *Service Record* needs to be uploaded to your e-portfolio within **1 week** of the service activity. The reflection needs to go deeper than just what service you performed and be more of a reflection on what you learned. Please see the exemplar below. There is a *Service Record* template available for your use.

In addition to the *Service Record*, you will need to complete the *ANS Service Activity Log*. The *ANS Service Activity Log* will be kept by different teachers or administrators at the school. When you complete community service, please see your designated teacher/administrator and fill out the *ANS Service Activity Log*.
